Remus Area Historical Society (RAHS) - Activities

⇒ The "Honoring Our Community" project is nearing completion thanks to grant makers and Remus Museum volunteers. The project highlights the industriousness and cooperative spirit of early residents that helped build the Remus community. The funders included: Consumers Energy Foundation; CARES Act via the Michigan Council for Arts and Cultural Affairs and the National Endowment for the Arts; Mecosta County Community Foundation, an affiliate of Fremont Area Community Foundation; Remus Downtown Development Authority; and Wal-Mart. While visiting Remus, residents and tourists can enjoy 17 historical placards displayed in windows (like the Remus Consolidated School



bus shown above). A permanent installation for the placards is in the planning stages. In addition, the film/slideshow featuring dozens of Remus area families, will be ready by end of 2021. 


RAHS volunteers have been working to align death and burial records with cemetery plots in the **Morton Township Cemetery** located at 70th Avenue and 7 Mile Road. Once completed, the verified records will be shared with the Township and uploaded to Find-A-Grave. The volunteers were pleased to find the John E. Morton family plot. Born in 1820 in Nova Scotia, J.E. Morton arrived in Mecosta County in 1869 and created a successful pine log sales business before buying 160 acres to farm. The land was then part of Wheatland Township. In 1876, he led a petitioning effort to separate Morton from

Wheatland Township. Though he wanted the new township to be named after Presidential candidate Hayes, the Board of Supervisors named the new township Morton. The first meeting was held at the Little River School. *Source: Chap-*
